


Verses Intoned by the Canonarch:

- Verse 1: God be gracious unto us and bless us, and cause His face to shine upon us and have mercy on us.
- Verse 2: That we may know upon the earth Thy way, among all the nations Thy salvation.
- Verse 3: Let the peoples give Thee praise, O God, let all the peoples praise Thee; the earth hath yielded her fruit.
- Verse 4: Let God, our God, bless us; let God bless us, and let all the ends of the earth fear Him.
- Verse 5: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. Both now and ever, and unto the ages of ages. Amen.





- Verse 5: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. Both now and ever, and unto the ages of ages. Amen.



Note: According to Athonite Typica, the following verses #13 and #14 are omitted, since no more than twelve troparia are to be chanted before the "Glory..." in an ode.











